Rotarian Tim gave an extremely interesting 'Job Talk' on the 8th February where he gave an insight into his distinguised career in the RAF. Below is a much shorter version of the talk for those that did not attend and for those that did it includes some more personal details



<u>Tim Barton</u> <u>Inducted: 21st December 2016</u>

I have strong links with the West Country which I have maintained throughout the Royal Air Force careers of both my father and me. I went to Chard School in 1965 and then joined the RAF in 1971 as an Ground Radar electronics technician, specialising for most of the time in Rapier Surface-to-Air Missile Systems. I spent 12 years 'in the ranks' in postings in England, Scotland, W Germany and Belize, attained the rank of Sergeant and was selected in 1982 for officer training at RAF Cranwell. I was commissioned in 1983 and spent the following 24 years as an Engineering Officer (Communications, Electronics) in a number of operational, management and staff appointments in England, N Ireland, W Germany and Iraq. Over the years, I managed teams of up to 300 people to support equipment that ranged across the electromagnetic spectrum from elderly, long-range radars

to their state-of-the-art replacements, airfield radars and navigation aids, world-wide radio communications, satellite comms and Information Computer Technology systems. I completed my RAF career as a Group Captain in 2008 and moved to my family roots in Hemyock in the Blackdown Hills. After refurbishing our old house and over-seeing our new-build, I formed my own company to undertake contracts specialising in project management and the business change associated with the introduction of new computer systems. I am married to Lesley and we have 2 children and 2 grandchildren. I enjoy family pursuits, travel, DIY, bell ringing, theatre, swimming, cycling and walking. I am also a Parish Councillor and a Director of the Upper Culm Community Land Trust. I thank the Exe Valley RC for their warm welcome and I very much look forward to working with them on various projects in the months and years ahead.



Bob Evans Inducted: 4th January 2017

Ended up as the Mail Centre Manager in Exeter, but eventually took EVR and after a summer off did a couple of Operational and Depot manager roles working for G4S, City Link and PHS over the next few years. I then decided to retire a year or so ago taking full advantage of the nice Mr Osborne. Unusual fact number two - when at Royal Mail I challenged the then senior managers to allow me to undertake external managerial qualifications. <u>Dr David Jenner</u> <u>Inducted: 11th January 2017</u>

I am a true Devon Dumpling, born and raised in Exeter, where my father taught at Exeter school and where I was also educated. During my formative years I developed my passion for natural history and Devon's wonderful countryside and coastline which I have kept to this day. After leaving school at a somewhat early age of seventeen , I studied medicine at Manchester University and very quickly realised I would want to return to Devon promptly as the city life was not for me. Thus after a short spell in Shrewsbury hospital, in an area of the country which rivals Devon for its beauty, I came back to Devon to study General Practice and have remained here ever since.

I met with wife Kathryn whilst working in Heavitree hospital and then sealed our commitment and relationship on a year travelling the world and working in New Zealand. I proposed in the depth of

the Daintree rainforest in Queensland with leeches, unbeknown, crawling up our legs. Returning to Devon in 1990, I was offered partnership in College Surgery Cullompton where I started working in May 1990 and was married in St Mary's Church Willand later that year. Kathryn completed her training as an anaesthetist and has worked ever since at the RD&E hospital Exeter. Sons Oliver and Joshua soon followed and then in 1998 by a "buy one get one free deal" with twin girls Alexandra and Harriet. At one point all of the children were at Exeter School together before departing off to University, with the twins leaving in 2016. This now gives more time for me to further pursue my passion for natural history and Kathryn to develop further her amateur artistic pastime.

I have remained a partner in College Surgery for twenty six years working now with thirteen partners to provide services to 17,000 people out of its state of the art new building in Cullompton as well as branch surgeries in Bradninch, Willand, Uffculme and Sampford Peverell. I have also been involved in medical leadership roles since 1993 being the locally elected G.P. chair of various incarnations of Health Authorities culminating in NEW Devon CCG from 2013-2017. In these roles I have worked tirelessly to try and improve local health care, but which at times has felt like swimming against a brisk current with funding limitations and rising demand. Thankfully the latter is largely because people in Devon are living much longer.

In 2017 I am relinquishing my CCG role but intend to remain as a local GP three days a week for many years to come and thoroughly enjoy that role which gives a unique insight into people's and family's lives.

By joining Rotary I am looking to develop new friendships with people outside the world of medicine and hopefully give something back to the local community.

I was born in St Bart's in 1947 in the City of London so within the sound of St Mary le Bow church Cheapside (not in Bow) so a real Cockney. I was brought up in Enfield, Middx. and went to Enfield Grammar School leaving at 17 to commence work as a trainee quantity surveyor, qualifying as a Chartered Surveyor in 1974. I married Jackie and had a daughter (Samantha now a successful accountant and CEO) and son Adam (a manager within a large specialist printing company who climbs mountains, Eiger, Matterhorn, etc). I worked for the largest QS

company in the world from starting work to 1974 ,mainly in their Harlow New Town, Essex office leaving to join a specialist tax expert QS firm for 2 years before joining an Epping based small firm in 1976. Clients ranged from HMG cabinet office, MOD, City of London, many London boroughs; universities in Leed,, York, Essex, Cambridge, London, many specialist schools such as Roedean, Exeter School for the Deaf, etc; Land Securities and British Land, Jaguar Land Rover, Tesco, Sainsbury, Co-op, Lidl, Aldi etc; hospitals in London and Yorkshire, and so on. I was personally in charge of the redevelopment of London Docklands after the IRA bomb destroyed the UK Radio-communications Agency which we had just completed and the refurbishment of Spencer House for Princess Diana and her brother Charles funded by Jacob Rothschild who converted part of it to his offices. My marriage to Jackie ended after 10 years and I married again, Linda a highly qualified Irish linguist with a double first from Trinity College Dublin. Sadly this failed too after another 10 years Always the optimist, I tried again and married Kim and we have been together now for 25 happy years living in Epping Green (in Epping Forest) with our 2 sons, Jamie 23 currently taking a Masters in Statistics at Manchester having graduated from Durham with a Sociology with Law degree and Harry 21 just graduated from UCLAN with a first degree with Honours in Physiotherapy, not bad for a dyslexic sufferer). I was a Round Tabler in Harlow for 13 years and a Rotarian in Epping for another 13 years. I retired as a Chartered Surveyor in 2013 at 65 and joined a friend and client as a Development Director helping him to develop and construct a major new Shopping area in Chelmsford including a new John Lewis dept store and another 300,000sq ft of retail with a 300 car park underground next to a river !As this successfully opened in September 2016 I retired again and moved to Cadeleigh to our new very modern house and small holding where we have 2 Highland ponies + a Highland foal + a Welsh Class A(so small) pony. Kim has shown native ponies successfully over many years achieving a second place at HOYs a couple of years ago and she is hoping to commence showing in the South West this year. Speakers' Corner

15th February: Julie Dent CBE, Chair of Devon Partnership NHS Trust




Julie joined the Trust in March 2013. She was previously Chair of Torbay and Southern Devon Health and Care NHS Trust, Chief Executive of South West London Strategic Health Authority and Chair of the London Probation Trust. Julie received the CBE in 2005 for services to the NHS. The Trust Board of Directors is publicly accountable for the running of the Trust and holds corporate responsibility for its actions. The Executive Directors of the Trust represent the interests of both the locality and specialist services as well as the strategies which help the Trust to achieve its organisational goals and objectives. The Non-executive Directors of the Trust share responsibility with the other directors of the Trust for the success of the organisation. They have a particular responsibility to ensure that the Board of Directors act in the best interests of the public and is fully accountable to the public for the services provided within the public funds it uses. Non-executive Directors can ensure that the

interests of people who use Trust services and the community remain at the heart of the Board s discussions. As well as having corporate responsibility, the non-executive directors hold interests in specific areas, working closely with managers, staff, people who use services and carers, They provide a link between local people and the management of the Trust. Services offered - the first step in supporting, following referral to our services, is usually an assessment - this helps us to establish the needs and the type of support required. The assessment can be followed by a variety of different types of care and treatment. The assessment may take place in one of the new Health and Wellbeing Clinics. The Torbay Clinic opened in January and will be followed with the Health and Wellbeing Clinic - Exeter, at Wonford House and a Health and Wellbeing Clinic in North Devon. Many people supported receive their care and treatment in the community but ongoing care and treatment may also be offered at Health and Wellbeing Clinics. A small number of people may need a stay in hospital to support their recovery and some people may require long-term care and support.Other services offered :- Adults and Older people (including a Dementia Wellbeing Service in Bristol); Perinatal mental health service - for pregnant women concerned about their emotional or mental wellbeing; Depression and anxiety - if you're low in mood, stressed, anxious or depressed; Eating disorders; Alcohol and substance misuse issues (Torbay only); Learning disability; Liaison psychiatry; Specialist Gender Identity Clinic; Sexual medicine; Devon Adult Autism and Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD); Personality disorder; Secure services; Forensic or secure mental health services (usually people who have come into contact with the criminal justice system);Offender services. Club Bulletin

<u>InfoMedley</u>

A fairly compact review of significant news, reports, emails of the past two months

Business Meeting January 4th 2017: The Treasurers report: Expenditure on £150 Christmas Box paid in cash to the Hartnoll and a £45 speaker fee (Stephen Powles) Income from Gluhwein (total profit £397), £40 in lieu of Christmas Cards and £65 from Heads or Tails at Christmas Dinner – the latter converted into a £100 donation to Shelterbox at the winner's suggestion. Donations made to Shelterbox (above - not yet acknowledged); Salvation Army £375 (acknowledged) and CHAT (£375 acknowledged) and Royal Agricultural Benevolent Association (Arthur Heywood draw win, £100 – acknowledged). Proposed by KM that a further £375 pounds now be donated to the Salvation Army in Tiverton. Seconded by Rotarian Reynolds who asked that the reasons are annexed to these minutes. Carried. (see *annexe A for a copy of the written summary provided to club) Youth Committee: encouraged all members to rise to the challenge to speak to 3 potential Rotaract members in the 18 to 30 age range. Charlotte offered to follow up any leads thought worthwhile after those conversations. Communications: The new communication subcommittee dealing with IHC, websites, social media etc. have yet to hold their inaugural meeting. A meeting is planned soon. The president urged them to be in a position to report back to the next meeting as there are some aspects which are now becoming urgent. Rotarian Denman expressed concern at the level of monies held in our charity account believing that members and Council should take steps to identify suitable causes rather than allowing the club to hold such large sums. Rotarian Steele confirmed the International & Community committees had a number of proposals under consideration and which would be brought to Council in due course. A number of local and international causes, such as ShelterBox, Water Aid and Mercy ships were raised. Rotarian Reynolds pointed out that the broad range of speakers had necessarily reduced the number of speakers from charities and in turn reduced the number of applications. He would furnish the President with a list of those charity speakers who have offered to attend so that their causes can also be considered. Request was received from the floor asking whether the hotel could not offer an alternative fruit dessert to every member rather than having to be asked separately. President will enquire. The £100 charity draw was won by Rtn Reynolds

Some members had expressed doubt that the annual £750 donation to the Salvation Army was being used locally. Council recommended and the Club agreed to split the donation this year - £375 to the Salvation Army and £375 to CHAT. To discover more I visited them yesterday and spent time with Tony Godwin, who runs the local operation with his wife Heather. The church is in Chapel Street - 01884 253584. The money we send goes directly into the Tiverton Church's Community Fund which is entirely under the control of the Tiverton Church and administered by Tony and Heather to be spent in the local area. This fund is small - £3,000 to £4,000 per year and thus our contribution is very important. They spend it on people whose needs come to their attention, working very closely with CHAT, Social Services and other local organisations. They expect to distribute some 20 parcels of food and toys over the Christmas period. Much of the income is in kind - gifts of toys were accepted whilst I was there and a couple of bags of toys left for the Culm Valley Children's' Centre. They maintain close links with other Family and Children's Centres in the area (which includes Cullompton). At the Church they run brunch and lunch clubs, providing hot meals. They also run children's and youth clubs and many other activities. They also participate in wider Salvation Army projects, especially disaster assistance (e.g., they feed the rescuers at major incidents) and the Salvation Army's current major project to combat people trafficking and modern slavery. The Salvation Army itself pays for the building, which they own, its maintenance, the salaries of Tony and Heather and grant many of the activities run there. It is huge. There are two major operations (see their own website and that of the Charities Commission). The SA Social Work Trust has income and expenditure of the order of £120MM. It runs directly care homes and centres, a Housing Association and many other activities. They have reserves of £31MM - about 5 months expenditure. The SA Central Fund is larger - nearly £200MM income and expenditure, with over £500MM in reserves, which are invested to provide income - and funds all the other charitable activities of the SA. Legacies and donations account for two thirds of this income, the balance being trading profits. Beyond reminding me that the Chapel Street building is a church, religion was not specifically mentioned. Overall I am satisfied the money we donate is used well and locally and is very important to them. I shall propose at the next Council meeting that we restore the usual donation by adding another £375.
